Ampark School

Each child was given a word from nature - rainbow, tree, rock, for example — and asked to create a piece of art based upon it.

Their work would soon hang on the walls of the Yoho Center of the Arts in an exhibition called "Outside Learning: A collection of children's art inspired by nature," which doubled as a fundraiser for instruments for a Kenyan school Ampark students have forged a connection with.

According to Ampark's literacy coach, Francesca Michaelides Weiss, in addition to the school's fulltime music curriculum, students there are working in partnership with S'Cool Sounds, a music education program founded by Nina Stern.

Ms. Stern also partners with Cross Cultural Thresholds, an organization that aims to feed nearly 300 children of the Kibera slum in Kenya, and Ampark has gotten involved in that aspect of her work, too.

Through Ms. Stern and Josh Joffe, Ampark's music teacher, the school has linked up with students at the private Ethical Culture Fieldston School. Together they are using music to connect with students at the Drug Fighter Center School in Kenya, by recording their work and sending it over with Cross Cultural Thresholds when the organization makes a visit.

Ampark and Fieldston students have met twice to play music with each other, and students in Kenya have been videotaped accompanying the Bronx students' pieces.

The students at the Drug Fighter Center School, however, use plastic containers, cups, camel bones and eggshaped shakers to make their tunes, and Ampark wants to raise enough money to buy them 100 recorders.

The art exhibit in sales of Yonkers has already raised about \$460 in drawing sales and the school plans to continue selling them to those who could not make it to Yoho over the weekend.

Not all the parents and proud artists attended the show, but those that did were able to see a grand display of their children's work.

The space dedicated to the Ampark students was at the end of a long hall filled with older artists' work. In it a sign read: "From tiny leaves blowing in the wind, to a sandy beach, to images of the earth itself, great imagination and experimentation with the available materials."

Among the more than 100 drawings hung neatly side-by-side on the walls were fish of varied colors swimming in a dark blue sea, four trees standing regally next to one another, a lonely hill and rabbits.

Kids in first through fourth grades used Q-tips to blend the colors made by their Craypas, exploring the properties of their materials as they worked. They drew on paper conveniently bordered by a piece of tape that was later removed to give the look of a clean white frame around the students' creations.

Ethan Pratts, a third grader who had come to see his work displayed, said when he was given his one word he changed it so that he could draw two rabbits jumping across green grass with the background of a purple sky.

On Saturday, third-grader Lily Velazquez's painting was one of the few that had sold for \$20. She and Paisley Shultz, also in third grade, planned to return on Sunday wearing wigs and touting lemonade to add to the coffers. Last year the pair raised more than

vides Mr. Espada, "who resides in Mamaroneck, with a housing allowance of approximately \$2,500 per month to pay for a Bronx co-op which Espada claimed as his legal residence for purposes of his 2008 senatorial campaign."

board is Soundview's stocked with close friends and family members, all or most of whom allegedly approved of the egregious spending detailed by Mr. Cuomo's investigators. Many of those individuals are also named in the suit.

"Siphoning money from a charity would be egregious under any circumstances, but the fact that this was orchestrated by the state Senate majority leader makes it especially reprehensible. In New York, no one is above the law, and this suit should finally make that clear to Senator Espada," Mr. Cuomo said in the statement.

But Mr. Espada, who said he would "respond" to the charges at greater length another time, added that it would be a mistake to take the charges at face value.

"There should be no rush to judgment until the facts emerge," Mr. Espada said in the statement.

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

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
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
